WHAT IS SAFER INTERNET DAY?

Safer Internet Day is an awareness-raising campaign that started in Europe more than a decade ago to promote the safe and positive use of digital technology, especially among children and young people. It's the one day of the year when people all over the planet—**100+ countries!**—are sending the message that **making the internet great for everybody takes everybody**.

ConnectSafely has been the official U.S. host since 2012. U.S. Safer Internet Day has been celebrated in classrooms across the country and in big, student-driven events in Austin, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Washington, D.C., Los Angeles and other cities.

Past speakers include Vice Presidentelect Kamala Harris, Facebook COO Sheryl Sandberg and Sen. Chuck Schumer, along with local dignitaries.

CORE MESSAGES

With a global, community-led approach, Safer Internet Day encourages everyone to come together and play their part in making the internet better for all. There are many ways to do this.

Children and young people can help create a better internet by being kind and respectful to others online, protecting their online reputations (and those of others), and seeking out positive opportunities to create, engage and share online.

Parents and caregivers play a crucial role in empowering and supporting children to use technology responsibly, respectfully, critically and creatively, whether by ensuring an open dialogue with their children, educating them to use technology safely and positively or by acting as digital role models.

Educators can help create a better internet by equipping their students with digital literacy skills and developing their critical thinking skills, which will allow them to better navigate the online world. They can empower them to create their own content, make considered choices online and can set a personal example of positive online behavior for their students.

Industry can help create a better internet by creating and promoting positive content and safe services online and empowering users to respond to any issues by providing clear safety advice, a range of safety and privacy tools and quick access to support if things do go wrong.

Decision makers and politicians need to provide a culture in which all of the above can function and thrive—for example, by ensuring that there are opportunities in the curriculum for children and young people to learn about online safety, ensuring that parents and caregivers have access to appropriate information and sources of support, and that industry is encouraged to self-regulate its content and services. They must also take the lead in governance and legislation and ultimately ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and young people through effective child protection strategies for the digital world.

Everyone has a responsibility to make a positive difference online. We can all promote the positive by being kind and respectful to others and seeking positive opportunities to create and connect. We can all respond to the negative by reporting inappropriate or illegal content and behavior online.



This year, Safer Internet Day focuses on the idea that everyone plays an important role in making the internet better. Our theme is "The internet starts with I & ends with T" — asking everyone to think about "What I can do to make the internet better." And while we can take personal responsibility for our own actions, we can also work together. "Internet ends with T," reminds us that we're all in this together. That includes families, companies, governments and everyone else. We all have a role to play.

Everyone

Schools

- Use ConnectSafely's lesson plans for elementary, middle and high school students.
- Contact your local news station to arrange a virtual tour. During the tour, "interview" a journalist or news executive. Some ideas for questions: How do you manage your public online presence? How do you deal with trolls? How has social media hurt or helped your industry?
- Have your students write an op-ed for the local or school newspaper.
- Mobilize volunteers to coach seniors virtually on how to use their phones and computers.

Families

- Discuss our theme The internet starts with "I" and ends with "T." What does that mean and how does it apply to your family?
- Brainstorm "rules" for digital civility. Create an online and printed pledge with everyone's best ideas.
- Jumpstart family discussion about digital safety and civility. Some conversation starters:
 - You see a post or fact online that just doesn't seem right. How do you check if it's true? Do you share it, correct it or just ignore it?
 - An ad pops up while you're doing a search—you click on the ad—it takes you away from your original search. What do you do?
 - You're using an app that you have permission to use, but while using the app you get a message from someone you don't know. What do you do?
 - You post a picture of a friend or classmate and they ask you to take it down. What do you do?

Safer Internet Day (#SID2021) is a global event celebrated in more than 100 countries around the world. The event gained official recognition in the U.S. in 2012, with a joint agreement between the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and the European Commission to work together to build a better internet for youth. ConnectSafely was appointed U.S. host in 2013. The 2021 global theme is "Together for a better internet."

"Safer Internet Day is an opportunity for people around the world to look for ways to make the online world not just safer, but better," said ConnectSafely CEO Larry Magid.
